$$= 2/8 + 1/4$$

Next do addition:

$$= 1/4 + 1/4$$

$$= 2/4$$

$$= 1/2$$


$$C = 5/9 * (63)$$

### Question: 5

(1) Most discussions about global warming center around the impact man has on his environment. (2) Massive emissions of carbon dioxide by industry and transport are the prime culprits evidenced in this regard. (3) While global warming in and of itself is a controversial subject, what is clear is that it is not a phenomenon caused by mankind. (4) If man did not exist on Planet Earth, global warming would exist to a certain extent. (5)

The Earth is kept warm by gases in the atmosphere. (6) Certain gases prohibit heat from escaping out of the atmosphere into space. (7) This is a naturally occurring event with gases such as carbon dioxide and methane, not to mention water vapor, playing a natural role in the process. (8) If our atmosphere contained none of these gases, our planet would be a very cold place. (9) Scientists estimate it would be approximately 30 degrees colder, leading potentially to massive ice formations throughout the world as we know it. (10)

(14) When night falls, there is nothing present that stores the heat of the day.

Here's the expanded explanation: - The sentence "But it is the less read of any of the books in the collection" is incorrect because it improperly uses the comparative adjective "less" instead of the superlative adjective "least." - The correct form, "least read," is required because the statement compares the book's readership to the readership of all other books in the collection, which implies a comparison within a group larger than two. - Using "least" correctly identifies this book as having the lowest readership in its group, adhering to grammatical standards for comparisons involving more than two entities. Thus, the corrected sentence should read, "But it is the least read of any of the books in the collection." This correction ensures that the sentence is grammatically accurate and clear in its comparison.

Hence, the term "like" aligns most closely with "incline" since both suggest a fondness or a positive attitude towards something. For instance, someone inclined to choose chocolate cake likely does so because they like it - they have a preference for it over other flavors. This illustrates how "incline" and "like" are interconnected in terms of meaning, making "like" the correct answer in identifying a word closest in meaning to "incline."

### Question: 9

Which of the following words is the closest in meaning to: Marine

By contrast, the other options diverge significantly from "marine" in meaning. "Lake" refers to a body of freshwater surrounded by land and is generally much smaller than an ocean. "Land" pertains to the Earth's solid surface not covered by water, while "Dry" and "Desert" denote places lacking moisture, the latter specifically being a barren area of landscape with little rainfall and sparse living conditions. Hence, "Oceanic" is the correct choice as it aligns with the marine context, encompassing both the biological aspects and the broader environmental and cultural associations with the sea. This connection makes "Oceanic" synonymous with "marine" in numerous contexts related to oceanography and marine studies.

### Question: 10

In which of the following sentences is the modifier placed correctly?

- A. After going to the market, the pantry was full.
- B. To please the teacher, the blackboard was erased.
- C. While cooking the dinner, the guests were entertained by the guitarist.
- D. Brad was excited after he met the famous baseball player.

This is likely not the intended meaning; the sentence probably meant to convey that the dinner was being cooked while the guests were being entertained by the guitarist. 4. "Brad was excited after he met the famous baseball player." - This sentence correctly places the modifier "after he met the famous baseball player." The modifier clearly and accurately describes why Brad was excited, directly linking his excitement to the event of meeting the baseball player. Among the options provided, the sentence "Brad was excited after he met the famous baseball player" is the only one where the modifier is used correctly. The other sentences contain modifiers that either create ambiguity or logically incorrect implications. This demonstrates the importance of careful modifier placement to ensure clarity and precision in communication.
